

A Nick in Time......first aid for woodcarvers

First of all, most of this will be unnecessary, as we all wear gloves right? Remember even with a glove, you can still get "poked" (more on that later), even if you don't get sliced. Ok, we were asked to put a little something together as a "just in case". We put together a basic first-aid kit, and donated it to the club. (Great, what do we do with all this stuff?) This article is not meant to be a medical tutorial, but more of a "uh-oh", now what do we do?



Simple cuts: A simple cut could be described as a small cut, say to a finger. It isn't very deep, bleeds a little then stops. Clean the area of the wound, apply pressure (if necessary) and once the bleeding has stopped, put on a really cool "Taz" or "Frozen" band-aid. Simple.....(I couldn't resist)

Major cuts: Apply pressure immediately! If blood is "spurting" this indicates an artery is involved, and is a major UH-OH! If it's a steady leakage, it likely is a vein. Still an UH-OH, but not as major. Have the person sit down, with the wound higher than the level of the heart (if possible). Keeping pressure applied, CALL 911, or transport to the ER! You will notice a theme here later.



Puncture wounds: The "poke" I spoke of earlier. Most puncture wounds in our environment should be small, since we all wear our gloves.....ahem. Clean the wound area, apply pressure and have ER or family doctor evaluate. Puncture wounds can be a little tricky, so let the Medicos handle them.

Let's discuss the most common type of incidents at home, workplace or carving club, Slips, Trips and Falls (no finger pointing here.....) Slips usually occur because of slippery stuff where we are walking, e.g. water, ice etc. However, even in a minor slip, it is possible to pull a muscle, or cause other damage. Have the person sit down and check for movement ability. I call this a BFC, body function check..... If everything works without too much pain, put some ice on the affected area, then point and giggle. If there is severe pain, CALL 911 or transport to the ER (theme again).

A trip can be minor (point and giggle) or more serious, of the uh-oh variety. If someone trips, accomplish the same actions as above, but there may be other injuries (abrasions to the hands etc.). Abrasions should be cleaned and bandaged. Again, if there is more than minor pain, CALL 911 or transport to the ER. I hear an echo....



A fall can be very serious! Let's face it, most of us are getting up there in years, and sometimes not as steady as we previously were. DO NOT MOVE THE PERSON! Remember my BFC from a previous paragraph? Ask if they can move their fingers and toes. If no, CALL 911! If fingers and toes are ok, move to bigger extremities such as wrists and feet. GO SLOW! If they can't move them or there is severe pain, go back two steps and CALL 911! Work your way to the larger extremities slowly, checking for pain all the while. Lastly, check for head injuries. If a head injury is present, STOP CALL 911! Some head injuries can result in a concussion, which can be very dangerous.....no, I won't say it. If at any point in your BFC the person describes numbness or extreme pain, CALL 911!

Let's discuss diabetes. Some of our members, yours truly for example have this condition. Some folks don't like to talk about it, and that's fine. No HIPPA violations here! However, for those who may not be aware, blood sugar can be a tricky thing to deal with as well. For instance, LOW Blood Sugar can result in shaking, rapid heartbeat, sweating, dizziness, impaired vision and a few other signs. Most diabetics know how to handle the condition, but they may need help. In the first-aid kit are some diabetic glucose lozenges (candy). If you suspect low blood sugar you can give them one of these to dissolve in their mouth.

Signs of HIGH blood sugar include extreme thirst, dry skin, hunger, or nausea. If this is the case with someone who is a known diabetic, **CALL 911** or transport to the ER!

We're nearing the end of our journey into uh-ohs and reasons to call the pros (911).



Our next topic is stroke. Major UH-OH!!! They are no fun to have or witness.....no, don't ask. With a stroke, time is critical! Raise your hands and repeat after me, **FAST**. This little mnemonic device refers to FACE: look at their face. If one side is sagging or droopy, IM-MEDIATELY have the person CHEW a regular aspirin. Yes, they taste nasty, but it can save a brain. CALL 911! ARMS: have the person raise their arms out to their sides. If one arm is higher than the other, see above, CHEW the aspirin. CALL 911! SMILE: Have the person smile for you. If one side smiles, but the other side doesn't....all together now CHEW the aspirin and CALL 911! TONGUE: Have the person stick out their tongue. If it sticks straight out, stick yours out at them too. If however, it goes to one side or the other, let's make a choir now, CHEW the aspirin and CALL 911! Some people add an extra "T" as in TIME. Remember, time is of the essence! Time lost can be brain function lost.



Now for the final and equally serious UH-OH, the Heart Attack, as it's commonly called. These are also no fun, again, don't ask. The classic heart attack symptom is chest pain. So, how do you know if your chest pain is from a heart attack, or last night's enchilada grande? You don't! Docs do! If in doubt, check it out! Other symptoms can include numbness in either arm, sudden onset of neck pain, jaw pain, or lower back pain. Better yet, some heart attacks are asymptomatic (whew big word), meaning NO SYMPTOMS! Isn't that just lovely? If you know you, or your spouse, carving buddy, or other friend has heart issues, and they "don't feel right", then transport or call 911! Again, one last time, CHEW the aspirin! Be sure to let either the EMTs or the Doc know that you gave them one.

Again, this is not meant to be an all-inclusive tutorial on first aid, just some things to think about. If you want to pursue this further, I highly recommend the Red Cross First Aid classes.

Ok, gloves – check! We will paint no carvings red......

- *Average table size is 8ft, but some tables will be no smaller than 6ft in length due to space.
