- Carving will be allowed at the tables. (Talk and Demonstrate what you do.)
- Venders: The Wood Craft Shop, Moore Roughouts, and Loess Hills Sawmill
- *Average table size is 8ft, but some tables will be no smaller than 6ft in length due to space.
- Displays may <u>not</u> be taken down before close of show: 4pm Sunday.
- German American Society will be supplying Food and Drink at a very affordable price.
- LODGING: Best Western, Motel 6, Super 8, Comfort Inn, La Quinta Inn and Travel Inn all located at the intersection of 108th and L Street. East of I-680 on L street.

Also know as something to fill up the space




Well since it has been raining about every other day around here I decided to try and get some logs cut up. My sawmill is in a barn so I can cut when the weather is less then perfect. I decided to get some of the walnut logs cut up I have been storing. I have 5 or 6 left but I feel like I have put in a good start toward getting them all cut up. I managed to cut 3 walnut logs up on Saturday they averaged about 22" diameter or so each. I cut those 3 logs of my own and an elm log for the neighbor that is a lot in one day on a manual mill. I think it was about 600 bdft total. The elm log is a kind of funny story, I saw my neighbor pulling a trailer a while back with a log on it as I was coming home from work. I figured at some point I would get a call from him about it eventually. The time came in the form of a text "hey can you cut this log up for me" I said sure once I get the walnut logs cut up. "ok great thanks" a few days later "hey can I drop this log off I need to use my trailer" sure just dump it off at my house by the trailer. So I am cutting walnut logs Saturday and figured I would cut his elm log up. I had to cut 2' off the butt end as it was to big to fit in my barn door. It was also too big to cut on the mill without some trimming with a chainsaw. So I start cutting the log and knew right away what kind of tree it was. I finished cutting the elm log into the 2 1/2 inch thick slabs he wanted. I took it over to him and said here are your slabs, I asked him what kind of log do you think it was. It was an elm log no doubt about it.... Well I hated to break it to him but his elm log was in fact a basswood log from a basswood tree, so I am thinking he wasn't too happy however he did have some wide slabs. He was still pretty sure it was elm and I left him and said "Well whatever it is

Too many clamps?

Well I have been working on a couple projects of my own lately. I like to carve but I will be honest when I go over to PJ's house and see the stuff he is working on and then look at my carvings I get a little

discouraged. I have always like working with wood hence the sawmill, so I decided to build a couple federal game tables. The tables are pretty challenging and are in the shape of a half oval that folds open to form a circle. So the tables start out with a brick laid shape that is 4 layers of sycamore glued and then eventually cut into an oval shape. The next step is to apply shop made veneer in my case walnut to the front. It is time consuming but a fun process. I will hopefully have these two done for a show in Aug in Omaha. I know it ain't woodcarving but it is wood and I Love Wood.

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


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
