OK apparently either the newsletter is not being delivered, no one needs any tools, or my little puzzles are too hard.

So here is how I did it, I enlarged the picture on my screen, and using a piece of card stock I made marks the size of the can on both pictures. I then used that mark to get a size on diameter and length of the log. I then used the link from the newsletter and entered diameter and length and it calculated board feet. Using my calculations I came up with 15.5" diameter and 50" long. So that should yield 33 Doyle, 39 Scribner, 42 International

If you tried I appreciate it and if you are at Doane I will give you a \$10 gift certificate from Loess Hills Sawmill . I will try to come up with something different next time



The log yielded 47 board feet because bandmills have a very small kerf and the log scales are all based on circle sawmill blades that cut a 1/4 kerf.
